Outcomes of interest include misconduct, drug and alcohol use or initiation, academic performance and efficacy, relations with adults.

**Principal Scientist. Evaluation of Office of Violence against Women Family Justice Center Initiatives in 20 US cities.** For NIJ, this project conducted case studies of the 20 city programs awarded funds to develop an integrated domestic violence response through development of a victim center that include prosecutors, advocacy groups, police, treatment resources, housing and shelter, and medical services. In addition, a design was developed for a full evaluation of program outcomes at final implementation.

**Project Director. Program Review of The Doe Fund.** For the National Institute of Justice Dr. Hunt is conducting a program review of a re-entry program for homeless, substance abuse involved offenders in New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. The task involves the analysis of program process and replicability as well as the development of a scientifically sound design for a formal evaluation.

**1997-2001**

**Project Director. Arrestee Drug Abuse Monitoring (ADAM) Program.** In 1987 the National Institute of Justice initiated a landmark program to gather information about the type and extent of drug use among arrestees. That program, Drug Use Forecasting (DUF), grew to 23 sites across the country by 1997. Each quarter sites collect interviews and urinalysis tests with approximately 300 male and female arrestees. Based on ten years of DUF experience, NIJ expanded the number of sites from 23 to 35 in 1998 in the phase of the effort called the Arrestee Drug Abuse Monitoring program (ADAM). In addition to expanding the number of sites, the ADAM program now addresses methodological issues that have limited the use of the earlier DUF data. All sites now operate with standard data collection protocols developed and implemented by the

contract. In addition, under the direction of Abt Associates all ADAM sites (counties) operate under a probability based sampling plan allowing estimation of the prevalence of a range of characteristics and behaviors of arrestees in each of the 35 counties. In addition, a new instrument was developed with a broader public health focus than found in DUF. The new instrument includes information on dependency, treatment, mental health and drug market activity. Additionally, ADAM has begun to expand its focus to include international Arrestee Drug Abuse Monitoring, (I-ADAM). To date, partnering has taken place with the following countries: Australia, Chile, England, Scotland and South Africa. (Client: Department of Justice - National Institute of Justice)

**Project Director. Evaluation of Kansas City COMBAT Program.** This project was designed to evaluate the impact of the use of a unique countywide sales tax in Jackson County, Missouri, which produces funds for an integrated drug enforcement, treatment and prevention initiative. The evaluation employed court, police, treatment program and school data as well as hundreds of in person interviews to develop a complete process and impact evaluation of the COMBAT initiative. It also included a random digit dialing telephone survey of community members about the initiative. (Client: National Institute of Justice.)

**Senior Scientist. Evaluation of an In-Prison Drug Abuse Treatment Program.** The Massachusetts Department of Correction is providing an intensive and innovative drug treatment program in eleven of the state's prisons, delivered under contract by a private organization. The program's approach is comprehensive, addressing substance abuse, violence, and other anti-social/criminal behavior. Abt Associates Inc. studied the efficacy and cost-effectiveness of this program with respect to two outcomes: relapse to drug abuse and criminal recidivism following offenders' release from prison. Analyses included estimates the program's cost-effectiveness, and examination of the relative effectiveness of the treatment program for different types of prisoners, and the efficacy of differing lengths of in-prison treatment. A follow up sample of 745 prisoners were tracked from release into the community for interview at 4 and 12-month junctures. (Client: Division of Clinical Research, National Institute on Drug Abuse.) Responsibilities include instrumentation, process evaluation.

**Co-Investigator. A Plan to Estimate the Number of "Hard-Core" Drug Users in the United States.** This project initiated a program of research that allows the size, characteristics, and geographic distribution of "hardcore" drug users in the United States to be monitored over time. The Program was conceived as a complement to and extension of existing federal data collection initiatives. The initiative involved the collection of self-report data on the life histories of people heavily involved in drug use, and the development of mathematical models of "drug use careers." The models are used in conjunction with archival data to estimate the size of the drug using population that has a non-zero probability of experiencing contact with criminal justice, drug treatment, health, and shelter provision agencies. These "anchor points" were then used in conjunction with more readily available information to produce synthetic estimates of the size of the hard-core population of drug users in the country as a whole. The methods were tested in a pilot study conducted in Cook County, Illinois. The study completed approximately 4,000 screening questionnaires and 1,100 in-person interviews and collected 660 hair specimens. The research ultimately allowed the consequences of alternative modes of federal intervention to be assessed. (Client: Office of National Drug Control Policy.)

**Senior Scientist. Task Order Contract for Data Tabulation and Analysis.** For the Office of National Drug Control Policy, Abt Associates has completed several studies: estimating the number of heavy drug users in the U.S., estimating the amount of drugs consumed by those users, estimating the retail value of that drug consumption, and estimating the treatment needs engendered by that consumption. Studies include:

treatment needs among pregnant drug users, differential impact of the "drug war" on minority group members, patterns of arrest for drug-law crimes, and compilations of drug use indicators. For ONDCP, Dr. Hunt has analyzed trends in heroin use from the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, DUF and the NADR data, developed a profile of heavy cocaine users and directs a quarterly survey of ethnographic, law enforcement and treatment provider services nationwide on drug use patterns. In addition, Dr. Hunt directed the development of the quarterly *Pulse Check* reports on the status of drug use in the nation for ONDCP. Conducted four times a year, this report involved conversations with drug researchers, epidemiologists, treatment providers and police across the country on a variety of drug related issues.

**Senior Scientist. Evaluation of Alcohol and Substance Abuse Treatment for Native American and Alaskan Indian Women.** As a subcontractor to Social Support International, a Native American firm, Abt Associates participated in a multi-site evaluation of the effectiveness of services for NA/AI women in the treatment of alcohol and substance abuse. This involved the development of intake and follow-up instruments as well as process and program evaluation tools for a variety of service types used in Indian Health Service facilities across the country. (Client: Social Support International and the U.S. Indian Health Services.)

**Project Director. *Pulse Check*.** For the Office of National Drug Control Policy, Dr. Hunt bi-annual monographs called the *Pulse Check*. These reports derived from a national sample of treatment providers, selected law enforcement and ethnographic sources across the country to create a "snapshot" of what was happening in regions with regard to the use and sales of illegal drugs.

**Principal Investigator. Estimation of drug use among criminal justice populations in Massachusetts.** Abt Associates conducted a study into the feasibility of collecting a systematic sample of interview and urine sample data from arrestees across the state to be used in statewide estimates of treatment needs. The study data included 300 interviews from five booking facilities and a comprehensive sample frame of booking facilities in Massachusetts. (Client: Massachusetts Department of Public Health)

**Principal Investigator. Evaluation of Social Support Services for Drug Abusers.** Under a grant from the National Institute on Drug Abuse, Abt Associates conducted a study of drug use and HIV risk reduction outcomes for drug-involved women and men in Bridgeport, Connecticut. The study compares outcomes of clients randomly assigned to either a non-traditional peer-based counseling or supportive services program or to a traditional professionally staffed outpatient drug treatment program. Participants are interviewed at intake (baseline) and nine months post-intake, and assessed on drug-involvement, HIV-related risk behaviors, and a range of psychological and sociological measures.

**Senior Technical Advisor. Evaluation of the Comprehensive Child Development Program.** The Comprehensive Child Development Program was an innovative attempt by the Administration on Children, Youth and Families to provide early and comprehensive social and educational services to enhance child health and development and to support families in gaining economic self-sufficiency. From 1990 to 1998, Abt Associates designed and implemented a long-term evaluation of the impacts of two cohorts of CCDP projects in areas such as children's health, physical development, and school readiness; parent's aspirations and education; and the economic self-sufficiency of participating families. For the second cohort of projects, Abt Associates also designed and conducted an evaluation of program implementation. (Client: Administration for Children, Youth and Families, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.) Responsible for providing technical input to study design and development of instruments to assess parental substance abuse.

- 1991-1994 **Senior Technical Advisor. Evaluation of the Head Start Family Service Center Demonstration Projects.** This is a five-year study to design and implement an evaluation of the Head Start Family Service Centers (FSC) that coordinates services in substance abuse, literacy and employability to parents of Head Start children. Project tasks include working with a consortium of local evaluators to determine a set of variables to be collected by all FSC projects, designing data collection instruments required, developing and maintain a national database, providing technical assistance to local evaluators, and preparing reports on program implementation and impact. Abt Associates helped to implement a randomized design in 35 projects, including explaining the process to project staff; developing software to conduct random assignment; and communicating assignments to projects on a weekly basis. More detailed information from a small set of projects was collected by Abt staff during on-site visits. (Client: U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.) Responsible for providing technical input to study design and development of instruments to assess parental substance abuse.

AIDS Outreach to Pregnant Women and Their Children.** This three-year demonstration AIDS outreach and education program was targeted for high-risk pregnant women. The demonstration, at two sites, Boston and Los Angeles, involved testing a variety of outreach and educational strategies to promote risk reduction among women who are drug abusers or mates of IV drug abusers. The demonstrations were implemented by community-based organizations and medical clinics at the sites. In addition to coordinating staff, services and research at each site, Abt Associates conducted a process and impact evaluation of the projects. (Client: National Institute on Drug Abuse.) Responsible for overall management of project, development of instruments and research design.
- 1988-1991 **Research Director. AIDS Outreach to Female Prostitutes and Sexual Partners of Injection Drug Users.** For the National Institute on Drug Abuse, Abt Associates coordinated a three-year demonstration AIDS outreach and education program for these two groups of high-risk women. The demonstration was implemented in three sites: Bridgeport, Connecticut; Juarez, Mexico; and San Juan, Puerto Rico. It involved testing a variety of outreach and educational strategies to promote risk reduction among these women. Public health agencies, community-based organizations, drug treatment programs, and medical clinics in the sites implemented the demonstrations. Abt Associates conducted a process and impact evaluation of the projects.

National Evaluation Design for Impact of Drug Treatment on Communities.** For the Office for Treatment Improvement, Abt Associates developed the research design and evaluation plan for the National Treatment Improvement Evaluation Study's Community Impacts Assessment. The design presents a strategy for assessing impacts on communities of drug treatment enhancement demonstration efforts in over 400 communities nationwide, over a four-year period. Research focuses on community impacts realized through systemic and structural changes and community program and provider changes and will determine the contribution of contextual community variables to patient outcomes and community impacts. Abt Associates produced all research instruments, sampling frames, and analysis strategies for the effort. Research strategies include quantitative and qualitative techniques and were designed to integrate with and build on patient outcome evaluation efforts.
